The Masai Tribes and Herdsmen of East Africa have proven over centuries that cattle can be kept in areas where lions do occur.

For the last 12 years Makutsi has also proven that with a degree of organization, planning and control over the cattle, the two are easily compatible. These cattle are used to help the daily running of the business in several ways:

- Instead of burning fire breaks around the camp & fence lines, the cattle are controlled by two cattle boys to slowly graze the fire breaks.
- The manure from the cattle is used as mulch in the 2 organic vegetable gardens.
- Most importantly we can offer our clients healthy and organic beef at meal times all year round.

Dung beetles

- In one pile of elephant dung there could be up to 16,000 dung beetles.
- & Ball rolling dung beetles generally roll balls 50 times heavier than themselves, occasionally up to 80 times.
- Dung balls can be used for food or as a place where the female will lay her eggs.
- Only one egg per ball and up to 60 eggs can be laid per female per season!



Monitor lizards

- The monitors are the largest lizards in Africa and indeed the world.
- Two species occur in the Lowveld: the rock (or white throated) monitor and the water (or Nile) monitor.
- Monitor lizards sometimes lay their eggs in termite mounds.

Safari Sightings...

Here are two of our favorite sightings over the last few months.

- During a 3-hour afternoon game drive, Jesco radioed Natalie to join him at Big Croc with the Hippos. When she arrive, Zero and the 2 sub-adult male Lions we also lying on the dam wall peering down on the hippos, wandering if this could be their next meal. Suddenly, one of the Hippos charged out of the water and ran UP the dam wall towards Zero! Lucky he was quick enough to move backwards and avoid the Hippo. Afterwards all the Hippos in the dam were grunting and making such a loud noise in order to intimidate the Lions some more.
- Its not only here on Makutsi, but also in the Kruger where we can sometimes get lucky...Derrick took some Australian, New Zealand and Norwegian guests to the Kruger, and came back with the biggest smile...A pride of 18 Lions on 3 separate Buffalo kills, two more lion sightings later in the day, 50 Elephants, the rate Trumpeter Hornbill, Secretary Bird, Kori Bustard and much more...and of course 8 very happy guests.
